"EASTER"

This year Easter falls on April 24th, which seems to be awfully late in the year. So, I decided to research just how late Easter can occur, and uncovered some interesting facts that I will share with you this month.

Easter is a great time to share your faith with your family, friends, coworkers and neighbors. So please consider how the following info might help you open a conversation with someone and perhaps tell them about the Savior you love. Easter is a wonderful time to......Let Him Shine!

Here is a great scripture that exhorted Israel to look forward to their King who would forever free them and fulfill God's covenant with them. From Zechariah 9:9—

Rejoice, O people of Zion! Shout in triumph, O people of Jerusalem!

Look, your king is coming to you.

He is righteous and victorious,

yet he is humble, riding on a donkey— riding on a donkey's colt.

Unfortunately, most of Israel did not really recognize Jesus on that donkey as their King, so within one week after His arrival in Jerusalem on a small donkey (we call this day Palm Sunday), those who would declare Him King, instead crucified Him. Thus began the journey to the appointed time we call Easter.

"The name 'Easter' derives from the Anglo-Saxon goddess of Spring (Eostre or Ostara), but the Christian festival developed from the Jewish Passover (Heb. pesech, Gk. pascha), because according to the Gospels the events of Jesus' last days took place at the time of Passover.

Easter was originally observed on the day following the end of the Passover fast (14 Nisan), regardless of the day of the week on which it fell. In the

mid-second century, however, some Gentile Christians began to celebrate it on the Sunday after 14 Nisan, with the preceding Friday observed as the day of Christ's crucifixion, regardless of the date on which it fell. The resulting controversy over the correct time for observing the Easter festival reached a head in A.D. 197, when Victor of Rome excom-

municated those Christians who insisted on celebrating Easter on 14 Nisan. The dispute continued until the early fourth century, when the Quarto-decimans (from Latin for '14') were required by Emperor Constantine to conform to the empire-wide practice of observing Easter on the Sunday following 14 Nisan, rather than on that date itself.

Currently celebrated on the first

Sunday after the first full moon following the vernal equinox, Easter falls differently for Orthodox Christianity which, unlike Western Christianity, did not ac-

did not accept the Gregorian calendar reform in 1582." From <u>Harper's Bible Dction-</u> ary

Eerdmans Bible Dictionary also adds: "The Western church, following the Gospel accounts of Christ's resurrection in Matthew, set the festival on a Sunday, the first to follow the new moon which occurs on or immediately after the vernal (spring) equinox as determined by the Council of Nicaea (325); thus the dates for Easter may range from March 22 to April 25." Here is the passage Eerdmans is referring to from Matthew 28:1–7:

"¹Early on Sunday morning, as the new day was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went out to visit the tomb.

² Suddenly there was a great earthquake! For an angel of the Lord came down from heaven, rolled aside the stone, and sat on it. ³ His face shone like lightning, and His clothing was as white as snow. ⁴ The guards shook with fear when they saw Him, and

> they fell into a dead faint. ⁵ Then the angel spoke to the women. "Don't be afraid!" he said. "I know you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. ⁶ He isn't

here! He is risen from the dead, just as He said would happen. Come, see where His body was lying. ⁷ And now, go quickly and tell His disciples that He has risen from the dead, and He is going ahead of you to Galilee. You will see Him there. Remember what I have told you."

And several sources cited the beginnings of Easter from what they called "an unusual translation of "Passover" in the King James Version of Acts 12:4:

"And when he had apprehended Him, he put *Him* in prison, and deliv-

"...you are light in the Lord. Walk as children of light." —Ephesians 5:8

ered *Him* to four quaternions of soldiers to keep Him; intending after Easter to bring Him forth to the people."

So here we have a lot of interesting background information con-

cerning the Biblical and religious foundations for Easter. But during my research I was reminded of what may be the very best perspective to help Christians explain Easter, as it was penned by Charles Wesley:
